"WHEN WE EAT THIS BREAD AND DRINK THIS CUP" ~ RESUMING COMMUNION FROM THE CHALICE

On Holy Thursday and subsequent Sunday liturgies, we will resume distributing Communion from the chalice. To be sure, the fullness of Christ's presence is given to us when we participate in Holy Communion through either partaking of the Body or the Blood of the Christ. Nevertheless, the mysteries of Christ's self-offering and our "taking up" of his self-emptying are more fully expressed and experienced when Holy Communion is given under both the Bread of Life and the Cup of Salvation. The manner of reception from the chalice is to take and drink. After replying "Amen", carefully receive the chalice from the Minister of the Communion. Take a sip. Then, carefully return the chalice to the Minister. Please do not intinct with the Host. The Ministers of Communion have been trained to distribute with care and reverence. Common sense tells us that if we have either a contagious illness, a mild cold, or a compromised immune system, we must refrain from receiving from the chalice. Children who have made their First Communion may receive with the permission of their parents.

Three Days to Rediscover Our Identity in Christ

During the Passover seder, the youngest person at the table asks, "Why is this night different from all other nights?" The leader then names those things that make the Passover seder different from other holiday meals. As we prepare for the Sacred Paschal Triduum, we may ask, "What makes these days different from all other days?"

The word *Triduum* is a Latin word that means "three days." The Church calls the three days before Easter—Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday—the "culmination of the entire liturgical year" (*General Norms of the Liturgical Year and the Calendar*, 18). During the span of seventy-two hours, the community commemorates the core of what they believe—Christ, crucified, buried, and risen—as well as the heart of who the community is—a people freed and forgiven, restored and renewed by Christ's resurrection.

These mysteries are too much for one day. They must take place over several days. Even so, the Church observes them as one unified celebration, designing them to flow one into another. On Holy Thursday, the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper ends without a dismissal, continuing into the night, and perhaps the next morning, with adoration before the Blessed Sacrament. On Friday, the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord begins without a greeting and ends without a dismissal. On Holy Saturday, the Easter Vigil begins after nightfall.

To prepare for the Sacred Triduum, members of the community clear their calendars to journey with Christ, with the elect who will receive the initiation sacraments at the Vigil, and with one another through death to new life. This journey demands spiritual preparation that is different from other major feasts. With the exception of the sacraments of penance and the anointing of the sick, the Church abstains

from celebrating any sacraments on Good Friday and Holy Saturday. The tabernacle is empty from the beginning of the Mass of the Lord's Supper to the end of Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil. Even the environment is made bare. On Holy Thursday, the altar is stripped and crosses are removed so that the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord begins without a cross, without candles, and without cloths on the altar. The faithful keep a paschal fast that anticipates the joy of Christ's resurrection.

During the Triduum, the Church's most powerful Scriptures are proclaimed, special rituals are performed, and symbols are employed. The washing of feet is reserved for the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. The adoration of the cross is observed only at the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord on Good Friday. The community gathered after dark under the shadow of a full moon is called for only at the

Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. The lighting and blessing of a fire, and the community processing behind the Paschal candle takes place only at the Easter Vigil. Unlike the common practice of celebrating Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist on separate occasions, the Triduum brings these three sacraments of initiation together in one grand liturgy.

The three days that make up the Triduum are different because, unlike any other days in the liturgical year, the community walks through the most profound mysteries of its faith. We encounter Christ in the most solemn Scriptures, rituals, and symbols of our tradition. If we do this well, we will be drawn into a deeper intimacy with Christ's dying and rising. We will know Christ's victory over death as ours. We will rediscover who we truly are—a chosen people, the beloved of God, unafraid of death, assured of new life.

REFLECTION

"Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!" ~ Luke 19:38

Nothing surprises me anymore now that I've been here [Santa Cruz, Bolivia] for over a week. So I'm not shocked to see a woman show up for the Good Friday service carrying a long ribbon-like piece of last Sunday's palm. Then, as people start filling the pews, I notice more and more of these yellow branches appearing. By the start of the service in honor of the Passion and death of our Lord, there are palms in every part of the church... When I look out over the crowded church this Good Friday afternoon, their custom of celebrating "Palm Friday" starts to speak powerfully to me. The pious folks who have come back today carrying last Sunday's palms with them actually show deep insight into the great paradox of Christian life. The bright yellow strips of palm are accusing fingers pointing to a sad truth: we are the same people who greeted Jesus at his triumphal entrance into Jerusalem just five days ago.... We are amazingly fickle creatures when you think about it. We pray, we go to church, and then without a qualm we turn and calmly crucify Christ in our neighbour with a well-aimed insult. We thank God with great fervor for loving us unconditionally, but then a moment later refuse to help a neighbour in need. Palm Sunday turns into Good Friday with alarming speed....

The palm branches have an interesting role in Holy Week. We saints on Earth carry them in the crowd on Palm Sunday as symbols of our belief that Jesus is the Messiah. Some saints carry them in the Good Friday procession as a reminder of our weakness and unfaithfulness. But the palm branches don't disappear with the burial of Jesus. No, they show up one last time at the end of every believer's journey. In the Book of Revelation, Saint John tells us: After that I saw there was a huge number, impossible for anyone to count, of people from every nation, race, tribe, and language; they were standing in front of the throne and in front of the Lamb, dressed in white robes and holding palms in their hands. They shouted in a loud voice, "Salvation to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!" In the victory celebration in Heaven, all the saints will be carrying palms. The branches will be the sign of our sharing in Christ's final triumph over sin, over our unfaithfulness and over death itself.

The procession has left the church now. A few dozen have stayed behind to go to confession. I walk over and sit on a hard wooden chair in the little open alcove that will be my confessional. The first penitent, a sun-dried old man, shuffles toward me. A well-worn palm branch is clutched in his gnarled brown hand.
