JUBILEE 2025 ~ PILGRIMS OF HOPE



The Catholic Church worldwide celebrates a Jubilee Year throughout 2025, commencing on the Feast of the Holy Family (2024) at St. Peter's.

The Jubilee Year includes many celebrations within the city of Rome and, also, local initiatives in dioceses around the world. The theme of the 2025 Jubilee is "Pilgrims of Hope". In the words of Pope Francis: "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision."

The Holy Father will mark the start of the Jubilee Year on December 24, 2024, with the official opening of the Holy Door of Saint Peter's Basilica. The Jubilee will

continue until January 6, 2026, the Solemnity of the Epiphany, with the closing of the Holy Door at St. Peter's. Dioceses around the world will then inaugurate the celebration.

In the Archdiocese of Toronto, we will commence the celebration of the Jubilee Year with a Solemn Opening Mass taking place on Sunday, December 29, 2024 at 5:00 p.m. at St. Michael's Cathedral Basilica. All are invited to join in this special celebration. Please note that the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be available prior to the Eucharist from 3:30 p.m. to 4:45 p.m.

May this Holy Year provide a grace-filled opportunity to nurture the seeds of faith for you and your loved ones, immersing ourselves as Pilgrims of Hope into a year-long journey of prayer, witness and service drawing on the example of Jesus, our Lord.

WHAT IS THE JUBILEE?



"Jubilee" is the name given to a particular year; the name comes from the instrument used to mark its launch. In this case, the instrument in question is the *yobel* [or *shofar*] the ram's horn, used to proclaim the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur). This (Jewish) holiday occurs every year, but it takes on special significance when it marks the beginning of a Jubilee year. We can find an early indication of it in the Bible: a

Jubilee year was to be marked every 50 years, since this would be an "extra" year, one which would happen every seven weeks of seven years, i.e., every 49 years (cf. Leviticus 25:8-13). Even though it wasn't easy to organise, it was intended to be marked as a time to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation, and involved the forgiveness of debts, the return of misapppropriated land, and a fallow period for the fields.

Quoting the prophet Isaiah, the Gospel of Luke describes Jesus' mission in this way: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord," (Luke 4:18-19; cf. Isaiah 61:1-2). Jesus lives out these words in his daily life, in his encounters with others and in his relationships, all of which bring about liberation and conversion.

In 1300, Pope Boniface VIII called the first Jubilee, also known as a "Holy Year," since it is a time in which God's holiness transforms us. The frequency of Holy Years has changed over time: at first, they were celebrated every 100 years; later, in 1343 Pope Clement VI reduced the gap between Jubilees to every 50 years, and in 1470 Pope Paul II made it every 25 years. There have also been "extraordinary" Holy Years: for example, in 1933 Pope Pius XI chose to commemorate the 1900th anniversary of the Redemption, and in 2015 Pope Francis proclaimed the Year of Mercy as an extraordinary jubilee. The way in which Jubilee Years are marked has also changed through the centuries: originally the Holy Year consisted of a pilgrimage to the Roman Basilicas of St. Peter and St. Paul, later other signs were added, such as the Holy Door. By participating in the Holy Year, one is granted a plenary indulgence.

JOURNEYING AS PILGRAMS OF HOPE THROUGH THE JUBILEE YEAR 2025

Reflecting on the theme of hope, Father Matt Berrios, CSP, pinpointed Catholic spirituality as one that calls on adherents to "be the light of the world," harnessing their faith for the greater good. "Our calling is about being a beacon of hope, not just journeying towards something for which we long," he said. "Hope is, in part, defined by something outside of ourselves. In many ways, the Christian vocation is light, and you don't light a lamp to put it under a basket." At its core, the Jubilee is a chance for the global Church to renew its commitment to being a life-restoring force on a fractured, war-torn planet.

REFLECTION

"For us, a child is born, as son given to us." Isaiah 9:6

We often hear it said that the greatest joy in life is the birth of a child. It is something extraordinary and it changes everything. It brings an excitement that makes us think nothing of weariness, discomfort and sleepless nights, for it fills us with a great, incomparable happiness. That is what Christmas is: the birth of Jesus is the "newness" that enables us to be reborn each year and to find, in him, the strength needed to face every trial. Why? Because his birth is for us - for me, for you, for all of us, for everyone.... "For us a child is born," Isaiah prophesied. "For us is born this day a Saviour," we repeated in the Psalm. Jesus "gave himself for us" (Tit 2:14), Saint Paul tells us, and in the Gospel the angel proclaims: "For to you is born this day a Saviour" (Lk 2:11). For me, for you. Yet what do those words - for us - really mean? They mean that the Son of God, the one who is holy by nature, came to make us, as God's children, holy by grace. Yes, God came into the world as a child to make us children of God. What a magnificent gift! This day, God amazes us and says to each of us: "You are amazing." Dear sister, dear brother, never be discouraged. Are you tempted to feel you were a mistake? God tells you, "No, you are my child!" Do you have a feeling of failure or inadequacy, the fear that you will never emerge from the dark tunnel of trial? God says to you, "Have courage, I am with you." He does this not in words, but by making himself a child with you and for you. In this way, he reminds you that the starting point of all rebirth is the recognition that we are children of God. This is the starting point for any rebirth. This is the undying heart of our hope, the incandescent core that gives warmth and meaning to our life. Underlying all our strengths and weaknesses, stronger than all our past hurts and failures, or our fears and concerns about the future, there is this great truth: we are beloved sons and daughters. God's love for us does not, and never will, depend upon us. It is completely free love. [The Nativity] cannot be explained in any other way: it is purely grace. Everything is grace. The gift is completely free, unearned by any of us, pure grace.... Saint Paul tells us, "the grace of God has appeared." (*Tit* 2:11) Nothing is more precious than this. Pope Francis, Homily, Midnight Mass, Nativity of the Lord, 2020. Vatican.
