THE PARDON OF ASSISI - THE PORTIUNCULA INDULGENCE - AUGUST 2ND



In the time of St. Francis of Assisi, it was possible for Christians to obtain what is called a "plenary indulgence". These were very rare and often applied to the very rich and powerful people who went on the Crusades or who assisted the Crusades with their material resources.

St. Francis wanted the "average" person to avail themselves of this privilege in a new way and so he went to see the Pope. Honorius III was literally dumbfounded by the request for such a generous indulgence but in the end the Pope granted Francis' request.

Rather than having to go to the Crusades, all a person had to do was pray and celebrate Confession at the chapel Francis loved so much and which he called my little "portion" or in Italian "Portiuncula". This chapel is located in Assisi in the larger Basilica of Our Lady of Angels. Today this "Pardon of Assisi" or as is sometimes called the "Portiuncula Indulgence" is available to all people throughout the world.

The conditions for the Pardon of Assisi are:

- Sacramental Confession (within eight days before/after the 2nd of August).
- Participation in the Eucharist.
- Visit to a Franciscan Church and Profession of faith (praying the Apostles' Creed).
- Praying the Lord's Prayer and a prayer for the Pope's intention.

So, what is an indulgence anyway? The church teaches that sin affects us in different ways. There is of course the spiritual distance from God that stems from sin. There are also more "temporal" effects of sin that need time to heal. Purgatory was seen as a process of purification, of letting go of all those aspects of ourselves that we hold on to that really hinder us from embracing God wholeheartedly.

For the purposes of making things concrete images of time and space where used when speaking of purgatory and indulgences. Unfortunately, this sometimes led to magical thinking and serious abuses.

Ultimately the Pardon of Assisi is an opportunity for all of us to draw closer to God by means of prayer and conversion of heart. A wish that St. Francis had for all of us!

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REFLECTION

"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field..." ~ Matthew 13:44

...how does the situation of the person finding a treasure, and then selling all in order to possess that treasure how does that situation show how one relates to the reign of God? The author, John Dominic Crossan, once wrote a little book about this parable, along with other treasure trove stories. He called it *Finding is the First Act*. And that is precisely the point. First of all, one encounters the kingdom of God as a given. As the first letter of John puts it, "In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he loved us ... " (<u>1 John 4:10</u>). Then, in the sheer joy of that discovery, one lets go of everything else to embrace that gift. The point of insisting that finding is the first act is that it reminds us of a truth so much stressed in Paul's letters, that God's gift is prior to human response....

Jesus says the same thing in other terms when he says, "Whoever does not accept the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it" (<u>Mark 10:15</u>; <u>Luke 18:17</u>). Receiving comes before entering, just as finding comes before the selling and buying in our parable. This parallels the experience of those who, like CS Lewis, describe their Christian conversion as being "surprised by joy." That dramatic experience of God's grace is a special blessing. For others, the discovering of the invitation of God's reign in their lives comes after a long search. Matthew honors their experience by coupling the story of the buried treasure with the one about the merchant who finds the pearl of great price after a long quest; but, like the one who stumbles into the buried treasure, he too "sells all that he has and buys it."....

Simply put, these little parables are ways of reflecting on the love life of a disciple.
