JUNE 29 ~ SOLEMNITY OF SAINTS PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES

One of the oldest saints' days in Rome, June 29 was dedicated to the memory of the apostles Peter and Paul as early as the fourth century. This day, the church remembers two disciples who differed greatly in style and background, but who shared a tireless energy in spreading the gospel.

Rough-hewn and impulsive Peter left his fishing nets immediately to answer Jesus' call. Later, during the passion of Jesus, Peter made his denials just as impulsively, though he had pledged his loyalty to Jesus only that evening. Receiving Christ's gracious forgiveness after the resurrection, Peter went on to become the rock-steady and faithful leader of the disciples. Imprisoned three or four times, he eventually was crucified during the reign of Nero. Legend has it that he was hung on the cross head down because he told the soldiers that he was not worthy to die in the same manner as Christ.

Once Paul, who had been a rigid and violent persecutor of Christians, experienced the love of Christ, he grew meek—though never shy. He founded many churches and was able to affirm the fledgling community of believers even while he was admonishing them. Paul's writings are the first Christian scriptures; they are older than the gospels. After many imprisonments, Paul was executed during the reign of Nero. Since he was a Roman citizen, he was beheaded instead of crucified.



Coastal countries like Chile and Paraguay remember Peter the fisherman with nautical parades. In Hungary and in rural England, people braid straw from the wheat harvest into crosses and crowns to honour the two martyr saints.



REFLECTION

"So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows." ~Matthew 10:31

"Mercy is the name of God's efficacious love. The misery of his own people grips him to the depths and irresistibly pushes him to take in hand—'with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm' (Ps 136:12)—their situation and their fate. With the gathering of the people God chose, the Exodus remains the great epic adventure guided by God's mercy and to which the memory of believers unceasingly returns. The departure from Egypt, the trek through the desert toward the Promised Land, conjure up the image of the Shepherd-God. He leads his people, wards off dangers, procures food and drink, gives them rest in meadows of fresh grass, leads them to calm waters the revive them. His staff guides and reassures. With him they lack nothing and fear no evil (Ps 23).

Jesus will apply this image to himself when he solemnly declares that his is 'the good shepherd' in the absolute sense—'I am' (John 10:11,14). To gather the flock, he will give his very life (John 10:11) for the unruly and sickly sheep. He will bring back the lost ones, for such is the will of the Father who sent him (Matt 18:10-14). Such are the love and mercy of God that he should deliver his own Son, dead for the sinners we were, risen so that we may have life, and through him, be saved....[The church] must, following the example of Jesus, the true Shepherd, have a preferential option for the poor, those who are most cruelly wounded by sin and its tragic consequences. If she should retire into her shell, she would no longer be the Church of Jesus Christ; her image of witness to God's mercy would be tarnished; she would not fulfil her catholic, i.e., universal, mission.

But we must not forget that the Church is the actual assembly of all believers. To each the call of the Lord is directed: 'Freely you have received, freely give.'" ~ from Days of the Lord, Liturgical Year. Vol. 4 Ordinary Time, Year A. (Collegeville, MN: The Liturgical Press, 1993),97-99.
