THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT ~ REJOICE SUNDAY

Bright sadness is the true message of Lent. Little by little we begin to understand, or rather to feel, that the sadness of Lent is indeed "bright," that a mysterious transformation is about to take place in us. It is as if we were reaching a place to which the noises and the fuss of life, of the street, of all that which usually fills our days and even nights, have no access—a place where they have no power. All that which seemed so tremendously important to us as to fill our mind, that state of anxiety which has virtually become our second nature, disappear somewhere and we begin to feel free, light and happy. It is not the noisy and superficial happiness which comes and goes twenty times a day and is so fragile and fugative; it is a deep happiness which comes not from a single and particular reason but from our soul having, in the words of Dostoyevsky, touched "another world." And that which it has touched is made up of light and peace and joy, of an inexpressible trust.

ICON OF ST. JOSEPH - ON DISPLAY - MARCH 11 TO 17

St. Joseph carried out his mission of raising, guarding, and preparing Christ quietly, courageously, and faithfully. For that faithful work, St. Joseph was rewarded — not with seeing the fruits of his labor in this life, but with the incomparable prize of glory in heaven.

This beautiful icon is housed at St. Joseph's Oratory in Montréal, Canada's preeminent Shrine to St. Joseph, founded by St. André Bessette. The original is written (prayerfully painted) by Elizabeth Bergeron, from a drawing by famed iconographer Alexandre Sobolev. In the image, St. Joseph stands with his eyes cast humbly down, but with a determined strength in his face. In his covered arm he bears the Child Jesus, whose own hand is raised, blessing the world. In his right arm, St. Joseph holds a flowering staff, a sign that he was chosen by God. The white lilies of the staff signify his purity and chastity. Taken together, the icon provides a window into the life and mission of this courageous father, a man who was one of us and yet called to a mission of incomparable significance. We give thanks to God for the gift of his fatherly example, and we ask St. Joseph to be a father to us. Along the way, may we also grow in our own imitation of St. Joseph's quiet strength, integrity, and fidelity.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT THE COURTYARD AND WALKWAY PROJECT



The total amount needed for this project is: \$1,364,002.

The Family of Faith Footnote:

When the Family of Faith campaign was launched in 2015, the parish goal was set at \$960K of which \$240K was to be directed to programs promoting faith development. Having exceeded our goal by \$329K, and with accrued interest, we now have \$497K on deposit with the Archdiocese of Toronto. To date, we have not used any of these funds. Since 2019 we have, however, allocated parish funds in the amount of 400K for expenses related to faith development in the form of salaries and program and activity costs related to sacramental preparation and Ministry with Maturing Adults. Therefore, we have requested permission to withdraw \$100K from our Family of Faith holdings to replenish our general operating account for expenses related to faith development. In addition, we have requested permission to redirect \$150K of our Family of Faith funds towards the Courtyard and Walkways project. Bishop Kasun has approved this request. The remaining \$247K of Family of Faith funds, on deposit with the Archdiocese, will be available for future faith formation programs.

Special Fundraising Footnote

We need to raise \$130K during this calendar year to help finance the Courtyard and Walkways project. Six second collection envelopes have been provided for this special fundraising effort: February 04, April 07, July 07, September 01, November 03 and December 01. In addition to these dated collections, donations explicitly designated for this special fundraising effort can be made at any time. Donations must be designated as Maintenance or Courtyard and Walkways Project.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only-begotten Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." ~ John 3:16-17

God doesn't want to destroy people and God doesn't allow suffering for the sake of hurting people either. Instead, God is looking for a remedy, as the First Reading [2 Chr 36:14-16, 19-23] implies. God is willing to use desperate measures, even the heartbreak of his people, to save them. And not only that, but God is willing to use his own suffering too.

As the Gospel Reading says, God gave his beloved Son to save the world. Christ was betrayed by his disciples, shamed in front of his family and friends, mocked by his community, condemned by the legal authorities, publicly flogged, and put to death by crucifixion. Any one of these things is enough for heartbreak, isn't it? And so, in the incarnate Christ, God uses his own great suffering as the final remedy to bring people from death into life, when all other remedies have been tried and failed. Heartbreak by us, by Christ, is for life not for death.

And here is what else we need to see. Jerusalem was rebuilt and the Temple was restored, as the First Reading explains. Christ's death was followed by his resurrection. In each of these cases, heartbreak was turned into joy. And so heartbreak is not the last word. Elsewhere (Ps 37:3-4) the Psalmist says, "put your trust in the Lord, ... and he will give you the desires of your heart." When the story is God's, heartbreak is not the end of the story. Joy in finding your heart's desire is.

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May the Lord bless you and keep you!
