

ASH WEDNESDAY ~ MARCH 5, 2025

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 5. Masses with imposition of ashes at 9 a.m. (includes the school community) and 7 p.m. A Liturgy of the Word with imposition of Ashes at 12 noon.

Ash Wednesday is a universal day of fasting and abstinence from meat. The law of "abstinence from meat" binds those who are 14 and older; the law of "fasting" binds those from 18 to 59 years of age. Parents and educators are reminded of their duty to introduce children gradually to the understanding and practice of penance. The actions modeled by adults will be the greatest influence in this matter. Christian fasting obtains its full meaning when we deprive ourselves of food in order to be more open to prayer, to share more in the suffering of those who are starving and to save money to give to the poor. Fasting is a penitential discipline

intended to open our hearts to God and others, a means of purification and spiritual liberation, and a witness of the depth of our faith.

Those that are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting."

THE JUBILEE PRAYER ~ REFLECTION ON THE VERSES



We continue our reflection on each of the verses of the Jubilee Prayer. Today's verse: "May those seeds transform from within both humanity and the whole cosmos..."

Last week, we explored the seeds of the Gospel, which God entrusts to us for cultivation through God's grace. Notice this week, we ask that the Good News of the Gospel, like yeast in dough, transform our lives, the progress of human history, and expansion of the universe *from within*. This is how God is present to us: intimately engaged in the realities of human

life and endeavours, including the continued unfolding of all creation. God's grace is incarnational, meeting us in our deepest longings with a person, Jesus Christ, who, through the power of the Holy Spirit, is uniting us to Himself and drawing all creation into God through Him. The encounter with Jesus in our daily prayer and sacramentally, especially through our Sunday celebration of the Eucharist, changes us more and more into His likeness so that we may bring His presence more and more into the world. We pray that our relationship with the Lord bears much fruit in our families, workplaces, parish, city, and country.

When have you experienced God's presence in your daily life? Have you ever noticed a change in your perspective that led to something life-giving? Could this have been an experience of God transforming you from within? Can you make more room for daily prayer this Lent to deepen your relationship with the Lord? How might you take steps to do that?

Loneliness is one of the greatest spiritual epidemics of our times. Believing that I am a beloved child of God, is one of the strongest antidotes. When we feel lonely, we become hostile toward ourselves and others. We begin to believe that we do not matter. Feeling small and irrelevant we live in an illusion of fear and disconnect. Lent is an opportunity, a moment in time, when we can change the way we look at things and spiritually grow. A time when we can move from loneliness to solitude by embracing the Lenten pillars of fasting, almsgiving and prayer. Drawing on the writings of Fr. Henri Nouwen, Deacon Michael Carrera invites us to connect with the power of God's grace and optimally prepare our hearts this Lent to welcome the resurrected Lord.

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REFLECTION

"Out of the good treasure of the heart, the good person produces good..." Luke 6:45

The three readings of this Eighth Sunday of Ordinary Time shed their light on what it is to be and to act as a disciple of Jesus in the very depths of one's soul and the community of believers. People without duplicity, whose speech, which they have received from the God-Word, reveal the purity of their hearts, their intentions, their sentiments (First Reading). One must be animated with the proper zeal. Clear-sighted, as opposed to the "hypocrites," one does not reprove others without first correcting him or herself. Active, it is manifested in deeds that arise from the heart (Gospel). They know that on the last day, when death will be swallowed up, the fruits of their labour will appear. Everything that is corruptible will be thrown off. They will retain only the pure gold of truth and charity. Then will they be able to join their voices to the hymn of the victory of life over death.

This sequence of three Sundays [6th, 7th, and 8th of Ordinary Time] makes the Christian assembly travel a route whose atmosphere is very well expressed by the opening antiphons:

Lord, be my rock of safety, the stronghold that saves me. For the honour of your name, lead me and guide me. (Ps. 31:3-4–Sixth Sunday)

Lord, your mercy is my hope, my heart rejoices in your saving power. I will sing to the Lord for his goodness to me. (Ps. 13:6-Seventh Sunday)

The Lord has been my strength; he has led me into freedom. He saved me because he loves me.

(Ps. 18:19-20—Eighth Sunday)

It is toward the Lord that all the texts turn our eyes, our prayer and adoration, even when they shed light on the road traveled by the disciples. He alone can proclaim with assurance and authority the paradoxical happiness of his disciples who hear him. He alone can demand that they be disciples animated with a zeal that has no limit of false enthusiasm, and is both communal and active.

But, in all this, it is he himself who is revealed: the beloved Son, joy of the blessed, seated at the right hand of the Father; the just man persecuted, killed for sinners, forgiving his executioners on the cross; the Son of Man who gave all for humankind, even his own life. This is why the Church and every Christian community gives thanks to the Father most holy, God eternal and all-powerful, joining their voices to those of the angels and saints.
