ST. ELIZABETH OF HUNGARY ~ NOVEMBER 17

Born in 1207, Elizabeth was the second child of Andrew II and Gertrude of Hungary. As a royal daughter, even in her infancy the issue of marriage was an important one. Ultimately, she was betrothed to Landgrafin Hermann I of Thuringia.

Elizabeth was an outstanding child who directed all her actions and intentions to God. She was intelligent, well-educated, and a willful young girl who practiced penance regularly, refused to go to Mass in embroidered sleeves or gloves (as she felt that these luxuries were unnecessary and gaudy), and regularly gave alms to the poor. She was often lost in prayer and, at an early age, put herself under the protection of the Blessed Virgin and Saint John.

Elizabeth was married at fourteen. Hermann I had died in 1216; so instead, she married his brother, Ludwig. The match proved to be a happy one. Ludwig loved her deeply and was a kind-hearted husband. He was generous and wary of misusing his power. His priority was the service of God, and therefore their philosophies and personal morals intertwined perfectly. In 1223, the Franciscans arrived in the area and presented to Elizabeth the vision of their founder and their way of life. She built a monastery for the Franciscan order in 1225 at Eisenach.

Ludwig traveled to Cremona in 1226 on behalf of Emperor Frederick II. In his absence, he left control of his finances and household to Elizabeth who in turn distributed alms, including state robes and ornaments, to all parts of the territory. In addition, she built a twenty-eight-bed hospital below Wartburg castle and visited the residents daily

to attend to their needs. The following year, after a brief return to Thuringia, Ludwig embarked on a crusade with the emperor and died shortly thereafter. Elizabeth was left with three children and became a widow at the age of twenty. She was deeply upset at the loss of her beloved husband.

Trouble was not far behind. In 1227, she felt compelled to leave Wartburg castle for moral reasons. Ludwig's brother, Heinrich Raspe, who assumed the regency of Elizabeth and Ludwig's son, disapproved of her management of her dowry. He offered to provide her with enough to subsist on each day, but nothing more. Without extra money, she could not provide for the poor of the community and her conscience would not permit her to act without regard for others. She did not agree to Heinrich's terms and ultimately, she removed herself to Marburg. Her last act was the completion of the Franciscan hospital at Marburg in the summer of 1228 using resources from her dowry. After this, she devoted her heart and soul to aid the poor and sick, especially the most severely afflicted. She died only a few years later at the age of twenty-four.

Saint Elizabeth of Hungary is the first royal Franciscan tertiary to be canonized. Within only four years of her death, Pope Gregory IX, declared her a saint. She is most remembered for her gentle, charitable nature and complete devotion to God. Her popularity was immediate with the people living in the regions in and around Germany and Hungary. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

May Jesus and Mary be in your soul.

It has been a true blessing and joy to spend time with so many Catholics throughout the Archdiocese of Toronto since my arrival in March 2023. This includes the dedicated priests and deacons, religious women and men as well as the numerous laity, parishioners, volunteers and all those who are working to strengthen the Body of Christ in our archdiocese in ecclesial movements and associations, as well as those serving in education, healthcare, social services and institutions.

The Archdiocese of Toronto is blessed with an abundance of workers in the vineyard of the Lord. I am grateful for your role in reflecting the face of Christ to all those we encounter each day. In his Sermon on the Mount (Mt. 5-7), our Divine Lord Jesus taught us that, as his disciples, we are salt of the earth and light of the world (Mt. 5:13-16). In fidelity to the mission to evangelize entrusted to the entire Church, let each one of us make every effort so as to proclaim Jesus Christ, bear witness to the Gospel and serve with a compassionate heart.

In 2013, our Archbishop-emeritus Cardinal Thomas Collins launched a Pastoral Plan to focus our attention and identify areas of emphasis to help bring us closer to the Lord, our faith and one another. It is now an appropriate time to review the current Pastoral Plan, updating the vision through the lens of 2023 and our current reality.

I would ask for your assistance in helping to identify what you believe to be key priorities and objectives as we move forward as a faith community. To be clear, this is not a synodal process – the synodal consultation requested by the Holy See, you may recall, took place locally in 2021-2022. Rather, I am reaching out to our archdiocesan family to solicit your thoughts and dreams, what you believe to be your **three key priorities** for our archdiocesan Pastoral Planning for the next decade. I encourage you to ground your reflection and responses in prayer to the Holy Spirit, the Lord and giver of life, so that He may inspire, guide and animate this Archdiocesan ecclesial process of consulting the Body of Christ.

I invite you to visit www.archtoronto.org/consultation to participate in our wide-spread consultation. We have made every effort to ensure the process is brief and efficient. Options are also available should you consult with others and wish to offer a group or hard copy submission. Please make sure every effort to complete your feedback by **December 15**, **2023**. We will then gather and analyze the results which will help guide us as we discern and craft an updated Pastoral Plan, to be shared at an appropriate time in 2024.

Be assured of my ongoing gratitude for all that you do and witness and prayers for your loved ones and communities. Let us entrust this consultation and reflection to the maternal mediation of Mary, Mother of the Church and through the powerful intercession of our archdiocesan patron, Saint Michael the Archangel.

REFLECTION

"The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.'" ~Matthew 25:8

<u>ARE YOU REGISTERED? IF NOT, ASK AN USHER</u>

"They didn't get in because they had to go try to find oil. Something no good event planner would ever have let happen somehow happens in this story. Clearly, the oil is key. So, we should ask, what is this all-important oil? To find out, the Armenian fathers first paid special attention to Jesus' own stories about oil.

One of Jesus' most famous oil stories is about a Samaritan who finds a wounded man by the side of the road after religious leaders have passed by without helping him. The first thing the Samaritan does is to pour oil on his wounds. Oil, in other words, is healing. By giving it, the Samaritan puts the wounded man on the road toward wellness.

A second oil story from the Gospels recounts how a woman anointed Jesus' head with very expensive, fragrant oil, symbolically showing that she understood his approaching death — something even his loving disciples didn't want to acknowledge. Love that spares no expense to validate the beloved is also oil. Without it, we are all indeed in darkness. With it, we light up the way into the kingdom that is already among us.

In other words, the Armenian fathers said, the wise virgins could not give the foolish any of their own oil, even if they wanted to. We can only store up the oil of kindness, care, healing and validating love by doing those things ourselves. No one else can be loving on our behalf. No one else can create the light of our compassion. That's just how it is. And one day, there will be no more time to accumulate oil. We will either have it, or we won't.

So, in the end, did the foolish virgins get in, or did they not? The story itself doesn't tell us, but the *Drnbatsek* [Palm Sunday] service [of the Armenian Rite] says that for us, foolish as we are, the door to eternal happiness will indeed be opened. And so we can hope that there is still time to wisely supply ourselves with the oil of compassion, charity, and love, in order to shed light on the arrival of the Groom who has invited us all to be part of his most joyous and eternal celebration of loving union with humanity."
