ARE YOU ABLE TO HOST A UKRAINIAN FAMILY?

When hearing reports of the war in Ukraine, and the millions of Ukrainians that have been forced to flee their homeland, many have asked what they can do to help. PRAYING WITH AN ADVENT WREATH

Awaiting the Light

The season of Advent lasts four short weeks. Nevertheless, it offers wonderful opportunities for us to center ourselves, find stillness, and prepare to welcome Christ into our midst. Creating time for peace and quiet is challenging in our plugged in, on-the-go culture. The classic home observance of Advent—the lighting of our family wreath—can be one place of silence and peace in the midst of holiday, consumer hubbub.



Your wreath can be simple or elaborate. You can use a circlet of evergreen boughs, holly, or mountain laurel or a ready-made, artificial green wreath. The color reminds us that while the earth has become dormant and quiet and the leaves have fallen, our life is everlasting in Jesus Christ. If you don't have a wreath, have the children draw a picture of a wreath on a large piece of paper that can serve as a placemat on which you will place the candles in candle holders. The four candles represent the four Sundays, and a lit candle is added each week. There are three violet candles and one rose candle for "Gaudete" Sunday [Third Sunday of Advent], in which we are reminded in the liturgy to "Rejoice in the Lord always." The candles remind us that although we are journeying to the darkest nights of the year, we believe that Jesus has brought light and life into the darkness.

Find a prayer to recite together, or alternate as the prayer leader, as your family lights the candles each night. Consider using the short prayer called the "Collect" that starts the Mass each week. Sing a verse of the traditional hymn "O Come, O Come Emmanuel," trying a different one each week. Light your wreath as a table grace to start your meal, or as an evening activity around which the family can gather as the day comes to a close. Notice how the light increases as we add candles with each passing week. How is this light growing in us? "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel!" and enlighten us as we wait for you.

Online Advent Retreat

With the First Sunday of Advent, the Church begins a new liturgical year through which the mystery of Christ is celebrated. Kristopher Seaman writes: "Christ's life is larger than any one liturgical service could convey. Rather, the power of the liturgical year is that we enter into 'moments' or specific events within Christ's life or that these events of Christ enter into us, through our hearing, through our communing, through our singing, and through our praying." A significant way in which the mystery of Christ is presented comes from our encounter with Him through the proclamation of the Gospel. Throughout this new liturgical year, our Sunday proclamation of the Gospel will be drawn from Matthew's account. Here is a brief overview to help us appreciate the Evangelist's perspective.


The first gospel starts with "a genealogy of Jesus Christ, son of David, son of Abraham." With this opening the evangelist prepares us for this Jesus who will be the fulfillment of major figures of the Hebrew scriptures.

Archeologists and textual experts usually date the writing of the Gospel of Matthew to around 80 CE. One piece of evidence for the dating of this gospel is that it contains nearly all of the Gospel of Mark. From this we know that it was composed after 70 CE (near the time when Mark was written). In addition to having Mark as a source, the Gospel of Matthew shares a large chunk of material with Luke, material that appears neither in Mark or in John. From this we assume that there was another source for Matthew, one that he and the writer of Luke used. Matthew also had his own information about Jesus that the other evangelists did not.

The Gospel of Matthew is unique in its fivepart structure: after the introduction (which contains the stories of the annunciation to Joseph [not Mary, as in Luke]), each part contains a long speech by Jesus followed by actions that Jesus performs. Part one is the Sermon on the Mount (chapters 5-7); part two prepares the disciples for their missionary journeys (10); part three is filled with parables (13); part four deals with church order (18); and the fifth part concerns the end of the world (24-25). Scholars assume that the evangelist adopted this structure from the Pentateuch, the first five books of the Bible. This is a big clue about the portrait of Jesus in this gospel.

Many of the people in the church for which the Gospel of Matthew was written were Jews. One of the main purposes of this gospel was to provide

consolation to those who wrestled with the compatibility of the Jewish heritage and their faith in Jesus. For this reason, we find references to patriarchs of ancient Israel from the very first verse. A genealogy filled with Jewish ancestors begins the text, and the evangelist fills the narrative with quotations from the Hebrew scriptures. All of this seeks to reassure the hearers that Jesus of Nazareth was indeed the Messiah anticipated in the older faith.

The Gospel of Matthew is proclaimed throughout Year A [of the three-year cycle of readings in the Sunday Lectionary], in the years 2023, 2026, 2029, 2032 and so on.

In art, the evangelist Matthew is portrayed with an angel by his side. The feast of St. Matthew is September 21.
