Liturgy of the Word with Children Sundays at the 10 a.m. Mass starting November 13

#### ALL SAINTS' DAY AND ALL SOULS' DAY

All Saints, November 1: We give thanks to God for all those men and women who have gone before us having lived exemplary witness to the Gospel of the Lord and now enjoy the fullness of heaven. Canonized or not, martyr or homemaker, they lived their baptismal dignity and helped others to encounter the Lord. We, too, share the same baptismal dignity and are inspired by their witness. As members of the one family of God, we rightly ask the saints for their intercession and prayer for us so that we too may experience the mercy and love of God here on earth, share it more lavishly with those around us, and one day rejoice with them in heaven.

All Souls, November 2: "From the day when the Commemoration of the All the Faithful Departed was first celebrated in the tenth century, there has been a focus on prayers for all who have died. Unlike a funeral liturgy, during which prayers are for a particular person as he/she transitions to renewed life in Christ, All Souls' Day is about everyone who has gone before us. This feast, then, is both a reminder of our need to pray for and be healed by God's merciful love and a day to be reminded of those of us who have died, asking for the healing of all who await the fullness of unity with God's merciful love." November is a month when we remember those who have gone before us. As Christians, our baptismal faith assures us that Christ's own death has broken the power of death. We reach out with care, consolation and prayer to those who mourn, and we pray for those who have died. In this and the next two bulletins, we will explore the ways in which we accompany those who have died and those who grieve through the Order of Christian Funerals.

### Order of Christian Funerals I; The Vigil

The vigil (or wake) service is the first of the three primary rites of the Catholic funeral liturgy. Along with the funeral liturgy itself and the rite of committal, these rites mark significant moments for the mourners as they come to terms with the loss of their loves one. Frequently, the vigil is the first public gathering of the deceased's family and friends an acknowledgement of the reality of death when it feels so unreal. This time of keeping watch in the presence of the deceased is an invitation to share the memories that forged the bond between the deceased and the mourners. It includes both formal and informal opportunities for all to express their sense of loss and grief.

It is in this context that the church invites mourners to recall "God's designs for a



world in which suffering and death will relinquish their hold on all whom God has called his own." In the words of the scriptures and through prayers of intercession for both the deceased and mourners, the church reminds us that death is not the last word. Music plays an integral role in this rite, touching unspoken dimensions of both feeling and faith. Sung prayer allows the mourners to hear the faith that surrounds them. A priest, deacon, lay minister or even a family member may lead prayer at the vigil.

This more formal vigil service may be preceded or followed by the recitation of the rosary or other devotions, if these prayers have special meaning for the gathered community.

Cultural practices are changing regarding funeral services. Certain elements are sometimes telescoped, resulting in one major liturgical moment (often the funeral liturgy) with an abridged time of vigil immediately before the liturgy or perhaps a private interment the next day. Christians are challenged to balance carefully what is lost and what is gained by these practices. The options chosen should respect the wishes of the deceased. But in a sense, funeral rites are for the survivors and so should best serve the mourners and the faith community.

#### REFLECTION

"Today salvation has come to this house, because he too is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost." Luke 19:9

"One could even say that the call and the conversion of Zacchaeus constitutes a sort of summary of the whole of Luke's Gospel. In Jesus we see the true face of God the Father who forgives whomever is converted. Receiving salvation joyfully involves not only not doing evil to others but also being cheerfully rid of all that might slow us down on the road to Jerusalem, on which Jesus draws us....

The Church is a collection of pardoned sinners who have become children of Abraham by their faith in the one whom God has sent 'to seek and save what was lost.' It must not forget this but proclaim it to all. Not only by receiving those sinners who come of their own accord but going out among them, lifting its eyes to see those who look on from afar, and inviting itself into their homes: 'Zacchaeus, come down quickly, for today I must stay in your house.'"
